Post Covid-19 Strategy

Major changes will be seen when "live" inprison *NewLife Behavior* classes resume. These are highly effective materials to help participants transform negative behavior to positive. An average class begins with 30 students.

Extensive use will be made of English and Spanish versions of two Bible study-by-mail series – "There <u>IS</u> a Better Way" and the *Prisoners of Hope*. The aim of both is to powerfully present the Gospel.

One curriculum seeks to transform conduct (character) while the other aims to translate souls from one state (lost) to another.

ANOTHER LOOK AT SUBSTANCE ABUSE & RECOVERY

<u>Christians Against Substance Abuse</u> (CASA) is now thirty-two years old, beginning in 1988 in Corpus Christi, Texas.

Alcoholics Anonymous (AA) is *fifty-three years* older, starting in Akron, Ohio in 1935 by Bill Wilson and Dr. Bob. As opposed to today, students of AA history tell of its early emphasis on God and the Bible.


I would like to share a few personal observations on recovery.


One approaching addiction recovery with a spiritual foundation

based on a meaningful relationship with God and a decent knowledge of Bible fundamentals is at a distinct advantage. Step Two ("coming to believe God can restore sanity") is not nearly such a long journey. And Step Three ("turning my will and life over to God's care") is as *natural* a return as Peter after his repetitious denials.

The stranger one is to the God of the Bible, the more difficult the spiritual recovery process.

It that case, it is no wonder that "God" may be a *doorknob*. In time – with diligent effort and individual persistence – the distance can be made up. However, this person's early progress is more "step-dependent." Thus, he or she is a greater source of immediate help to others lacking spiritual history.





He does not come quoting scripture because it is not his *style* and he knows little. His thoughts are "step-oriented" *first* and "Bible-related" secondly. Maintaining sobriety plus learning the Bible swiftly and thoroughly is not common nor easy. Consider the advantage enjoyed by April Askew, Pinky Bates, Richard Shaffer, Don Umphrey, and many others . . . they did not need someone to first convince them of the inspiration of the Bible or that there are two main divisions known as the *Old* and "New" Testaments.

SUBSTANCE ABUSE

It is significant to note that they entered the recovery process with 100% assurance that sobriety pleases God, "Providence" was on their side, and He is eager to help! Yes, like Peter, they must overcome embarrassment, guilt, and shame, but . . . compared to the doorknob, ten thousand angels are perched and ready to leap into action! This person has a deeper and more powerful source to draw on when helping others with strong spiritual histories.

The biggest error of "Non-Addict Christians" is pushing the Bible to "convert" the addict speedily. He is eager to escape guilt and may quickly jump in the baptistry but do not be shocked when asked to "do it again" later. Hopefully, we are past thinking that when we baptize a person with a "drinking problem" – problem solved. Personally, I refrain from seriously discussing the weather with one who drunk or high. If under the influence and a lover, he agrees with me that the sun is shining in a hail-storm. If a fighter in this state, World War III is launched. Later, in more sober moments, we will get started with Step One. No matter one's spiritual background, recovery remains a journey.

All this is said to offer hope to *Christian* families. If you have an addicted family member that has been taught and understands the Bible basics, he or she has a spiritual foundation. You should be encouraged. Proverbs 22:6 remains true. One who strays but knows where "home" <u>is</u>, possesses an *inner compass* that provides an advantage to direct a troubled soul in the darkest night or in a Category 5 hurricane. *Never give up!*
